The Great Lakes Section Of The American Bridge Association

The sixth geographic division of the American Bridge Association came into being during the 1964 Summer Nationals hosted by Buffalo, New York. Extensive discussions had been held at the 1963 Summer Nationals hosted by Philadelphia, PA. Underlying reasons for this administrative decision were: increased membership, geographic proximity and political acumen.

This geographic entity encompassed all of Michigan, upstate New York, Western Pennsylvania, and the most of the state of Ohio.

Cities with viable clubs were alphabetically: Buffalo, New York; Columbus, Ohio; Detroit, Michigan; Pittsburg, Pennsylvania and Youngstown, Ohio. Expansion efforts included Akron, Ohio and Toledo, Ohio.

The Great Lakes Section was so named for its proximity to the Great Lakes of the United States.

Other notables of the region, included Zenobia Allen, long time top female player The Guatemalian, William "Bill" Friend, whom the "BILL FRIEND RACE" is named after. He is also the father of Colonel Bob Friend. He tutored many Detroiters and was for many years the top ABA player.

Included in the Great Lakes luminaries are John Stevens, founder of the Detroit Bridge league "nee" The Wolverine Bridge Club in 1937, his wife Georgia Stevens, National ABA secretary and Beatrice White, first certified female National Director.

No one can forget the impact of Pauline Taylor who strode on the ABA national scene in the late 40's; becoming the first female president of the ABA in 1969. Earnest Sweeney became Logistics chairman as well as caddy Master while his wife Vera handled supplies for the Association.

Finances

At its inception, the Great Lakes had no treasury. Each member city sponsored the Sectional and kept profits for its own treasury. 1967 saw Buffalo suffer a deficit of 400 dollars. This created a **Financial Crisis** for them. A treasury was established in 1975 to create an emergency fund and to publish a quarterly news letter. This news letter was later named The Great Lakes Flagship by Taylor Cox. The Columbus players gave a major boost to the Great Lakes treasury by donating Sectional profits to the treasury. In 1985, the section made a decision

to create a Sectional scholarship of \$800.00 which was presented to a Great Lakes college student annually.

The practice of providing housing for the Sectional Secretary was initiated by Anita Troy and later the expenses of the Sectional Vice-President were added. Transportation and housing to national tournaments were subsidized by the national organization. As national funds have decreased, Sections have been asked to assume partial responsibility for its Vice-Presidential expenses.

Buffalo

Buffalo had long been a part of the Eastern Section but with its close proximity To Pittsburg, Ohio and Detroit, it was deemed feasible to include it in the Great Lakes Section. Also its geographical position was adjacent to Lake Erie where the Great Lakes section was formed.

Buffalo has been a major player in the Great Lakes Section since its inception. When and after its formation major personalities were:

A major addition was the recruitment of Dr. Katherine Treanor, chemistry Professor at Cannasius College. Her creative idea of using college dorms and food services for Grade "A,s" and Sectionals enhanced the Section's treasury substantially. The membership was enhanced by the chartering of the Humboldt Club which produced the inimitable Cleveland Fleming.

Cleveland Congress of Bridge Clubs

The Cleveland Congress of Bridge Clubs located on Lake Erie was a part of the Eastern Section according to data printed in "DEFINING MOMENTS". The Congress was organized in 1956.

The Premier Bridge Club

In that same document, it is reported that the Premier Club was organized in 1932 by Lewis Hall which predates the 1933 establishment of the American Bridge Association. Meetings were held in individual homes. The 1942 Summer Nationals were hosted by the Premier Club.

The McGhee Club

Miss Jessie McGhee, an early Cleveland organizer formed the McGhee Club in 1954 as well as Jessie's Pips. Theopolis Taylor served as its first president while James Cleveland was the director.

The Burke Players

The Burke Players were organized by music aficionado and brilliant wordsmith Judge Lillian Burke. This club went on to become the largest club in the Cleveland area.

The Woodmere Bridge Club

Research leaves little documentation re: the Woodmere Bridge Club except It met in Orange Community Center and had 36 members in 1987. Its more renown members were Creola Alexander, Charles and Iola Frye, Susie Rice and Azalea Young.

Columbus, Ohio

Little information is found regarding Columbus' early beginnings. There were two clubs but no record of a unit. The clubs were the Buckeyes and the Little Bucks.

Columbus hosted the ABA's first Spring National which began on Wednesday during Easter vacation and concluded with a single session open pair on the Sunday afternoon following Easter Sunday.

This supplanted the GREAT LAKES Sectional schedule. The chief sponsor of this Spring National was Otto Beatty and his wife Myrna who became editor of the Great Lakes newsletter under Pauline Taylor. Prominent players from the environs:

Not enough accolades can be extended to both of the Heards, who served as convention managers and whose task was to provide services to the players at the most economical rate. Columbus was a major contributor to the successes of Pauline Taylor, Geri Wilson and Thelma Woodson, as well as a major contributor to the sectional treasury.

Columbus Contributions at the National Level

For a period of time, Wilson Heard was, the national convention manager. His wife Phyllis succeeded him upon his death in 1988. He was the chief advocate for Columbus hosting the 1988 Spring Nationals to commemorate the first ABA Spring National. Dwight Galley oversaw the ABA's first Pro-Am Game with pre-registration and an entry fee of \$2.00. Breakfast was served and more than 50 tables were in play. Identity tags were provided by Phyllis Hoard's High School Art Department. A presidential reception for all ABA presidents was also catered by the high schools culinary department.

The Local Tournament Chairman was Dr. Marie Stinson and Virginia Clarke was the National Publicity Chairman. Both print and electronic interviews were conducted highlighting ABA's individual and organizational accomplishments.

Dayton, Ohio

Arthur Wills extensively details Dayton's history in the ABA's official history DEFINING MOMENTS. Credit is given to Dan Scrivens of Xenia, Ohio for the now defunct Air City Club in the early 40's. However the modern nucleus is centered in the city of Dayton. Katye Gibbs was it's first president. Prominent members were:

Contributions of Daytonites

Dan Scrivens served as the second Great Lakes Sectional VP with Anita Troy serving as Sectional Secretary. Sam Lucas was selected as National Tournament Chairman during the Jacqueline Shepphard's administration. He introduced the concept of second chance Knock-out to increase guaranteed player participation and revenue. Anita Troy was appointed Sectional VP under Pauline Taylor and elected VP following Betty Alexander, thus making her the third Great Lakes VP. She chaired the 1974 Spring Nationals in Dayton as well as the 1977 Summer Nationals in Los Angeles. She was later elected Western section VP, National VP, National Secretary and appointed Convention Manager.

Detroit

Detroit has long been a center of bridge creativity and innovation since the organization of the Gogginettes by Lyda Goggings who then hosted the 1941 Summer Nationals. Shortly before this venture was the 1937 chartering of the Detroit Bridge League, nee (The Wolverine Bridge Club) by John Stevens. The Democratic club on East Warren was the first playing site. More playing sites were in dominantly Black residential districts i.e. Mt. Vernon Recreation on the North End, Mack-Mt. Elliot Recreation on the near East Side, the Birdhurst Recreation Center on Eight Mile, the Tireman Recreation Center on the near West Side and the Evans Recreation Center on the Northeast Side. Other housing sites were the Chess and Cue Club owned by John Armstrong, The Trade Leadership Council sponsored by C. L. and Marguerite Evans, the Fisher and the Highland YMCA, the Wilshire Hotel, the Tindal Recreation Center on Seven Mile and the Northwest Activity Center on Meyers at Curtis. Clearly, the City of Detroit through it's Recreation program played a major role in the development of duplicate bridge in Detroit.

Our Own Home

June of 1978, after wandering throughout Detroit, we found ourselves moving into our debt free home at 16596 James Couzens Highway. Accounts differ regarding discovery, funding and refurbishing of this facility. The funds generated from the hosting of the 1974 summer nationals were the major resource. Cornelius Cobbins, treasurer at the time found the facility on sale for back taxes. Vern Wills was unit president. Men of the unit i.e. Bert Johnson, Tom Cook, John Armstrong, Bert Hudson and Cornelius Cobbins donned their coveralls, picked up their spatulas, put nails in their mouths and paint in their buckets to set about the task of redecorating the building. Of course red carpeting had to be laid to satisfy the royal taste of Pauline Taylor.

Dedication

Thelma Woodson and Thomas Cook co-chaired the dedication ceremony which was attended by National President Arnold Jones and about 200 guests. According to Orville Foote, resident historian, early pioneers were:

Growth of the unit membership centered around hosting nationals and chartering of clubs. During Theodore Woodson's tenure, a sectional was held at the posh Hilton Hotel which set attendance records in 1971. The Summer Nationals at the Cadillac-Sheraton also set national records in revenue and table count. The Awards Ball centered at Cobo Hall was also a pace – setting event. Chartered busses were available for transportation to the hall. Each table of ten was provided with a fifth of scotch, bourbon, gin, rum and mixers for the participants. Beryl Bailey of New York provided decorative balloons for each table advertising the 1975 Summer Nationals at the Waldorf-Astoria. The Unit was left with sufficient revenue to purchase a debt free bridge home.

Death and illness of key players delayed the purchase of the Bridge Home until the 1978 election of Vern Wills. Her main focus was to realize the dream of acquiring a club house. Details are chronicled elsewhere.

The Motor City Duplicettes AKA The Duplicettes

Founded in March of 1952, by Pauline Taylor ,whose goal was to involve all women in the challenge of duplicate bridge. It's membership was exclusively women. Pauline, its first president who went on to break the ABA's glass ceiling, motto was "Let us play bridge in peace and harmony together".

The Wolverine Bridge Club

Just four years after the American Bridge Association was organized at Buckroe Beach, John Stevens created the Detroit Bridge League which became The Wolverine Bridge Club. The formation of the Detroit Bridge Unit required a name change. The Wolverines' history parallels Detroit's history until formation of the unit. All data is the same including dates, contributions, historical figures, officers and individual achievements. They have led the way with innovative ideas, political activism and financial contributions.

Pauline Taylor became the ABA's first female president, Beatrice White became the first female national director and "Bill" Friend the top point holder in the USA while Zenobia Allen was the top female player in the USA. The Wolverines donated more than \$2000.00 to repair the roof while donating over \$900.00 to help replace air-

conditioning. Library books were donated from the families of Sam Ross, Orville Foote and Andrew Mells. Two Leg trophies were donated to honor Theodore Woodson. Thelma Woodson was elected the fourth female president and twice Sectional Vice-President. She has served as teacher certification chairman as well as scholarship chairman prior to her election to the national presidency. Thelma has continually taught beginning bridge for more than 50 years. PTA parents were first students. She was the first to offer free classes to club house participants. Shortly afterward she and Kenny Vernon became a team and have remained every since. Recruitment is a constant task.
